THE PRESIDENT'S PERCH

It never ceases to amaze me how many different interests, hobbies, experiences, and disciplines are brought together in birding. Biology, engineering, ecology, rehabilitation, medicine, data analysis, computer science, predictive analytics, and so many more fascinating skillsets are employed in the love and study of birds. This fact has been on my mind for the past few years, but even more so lately as I have explored one of those connected disciplines in depth.

Tracking animals with the use of radio frequency tags has been around for decades. (Below a bird with a green radio frequency tag.)



It wasn't until a few years ago though that we saw this technology miniaturized in scale, and magnified in majesty, with the application through Project Snowstorm. If you aren't already familiar, Project Snowstorm tracks Snowy Owls and is extremely impressive.

Likewise, in the summer of 2017, I had the good fortune of seeing a tagging and tracking system that Sarah Sargent was using for migratory songbirds. These technologies, combined with the dedication of avid scientists and enthusiasts, are advancing our understanding of birds.

For myself, over the past several months I have been actively studying the world of radio frequency reception and transmission and attained my Amateur Radio (Ham) license.

The PIAS Annual Christmas Bird Count will be held on Saturday, December 15th this year.

Participants will meet at the Ranger Station on Presque Isle between 7:00 & 7:30 AM, form teams and head out to bird designated areas of the park creating a tally as you go.

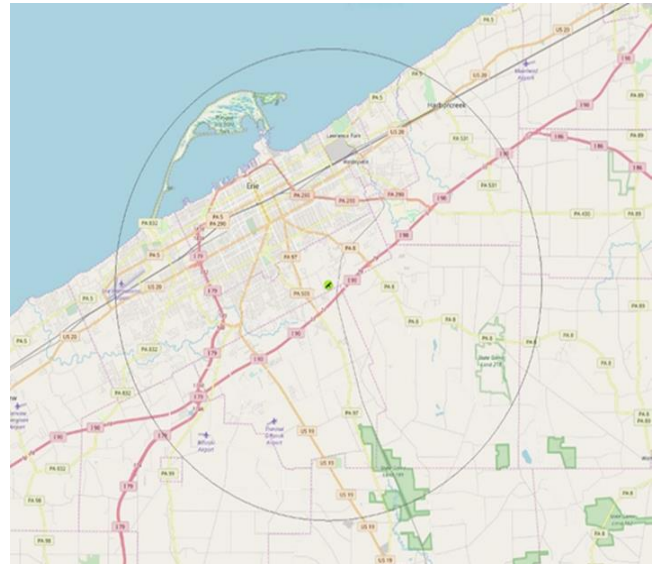
We welcome all birders, no matter your level of experience, to participate in this fun-filled day. We re-assemble back at the Ranger Station for lunch (bring a bag lunch) at noon to discuss preliminary counts. After lunch some participants choose to continue to bird/count areas that might've been missed in the morning.

At 5:00 p.m. we will reconvene at Hoss's Steak House on 26th Street and compile the final tally which will be sent to Cornell and added to the totals from all over the country and many parts of the world.

The dinner is not mandatory, but if you are not attending, please make sure your tally sheet gets to someone who is.

Also, if you cannot attend the event and wish to count in your yard you may do so if you are within the PAER count circle which appears at the end of this article. I will also post a map on our Face Book page and website. If you have any questions, please inquire on our Face Book

page as that is usually our fastest means of getting information back to people.

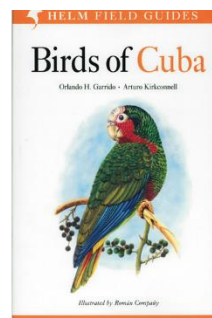

MAY 10, 11, 12 - 2019

If you haven't participated in one of our Festival of the Birds at Presque Isle yet, you've missed a good time, good birding, good food and good friends. There are many reasons why we have achieved maximum attendance over the years a few of which are that we keep the group small, we are very well organized and that many good birds are observed. Our registrants have made friends over the years and look forward to seeing them and birding with them again in successive festivals. Some registrants have even volunteered during the festival so there is a real spirit of camaraderie during the weekend.

There are three times when everyone can get together to compare notes and catch up. The first time is during the welcome reception held Friday evening when finger food and beverages are offered while listening to music by a local musician. The second is during dinner on Saturday evening followed by the keynote address. Yve Morrrell is our keynote speaker this year and will highlight the role and significance of Alaska and Hawaii in Big Year efforts. Yve completed and ABA Big Year in 2017 and ended the year having seen 817 species. The third occasion is on Sunday around noon when lunch is provided and the final bird tally occurs.



The activities during the three days of the festival consist mainly of birding field trips and there is an afternoon of workshops related to birds. There is no need to register for most of the workshops or the walking field trips. There is one workshop that will require registration as well as all pontoon boat field trips. Signing up for these can be done at the registration desk.



Registration will be held in the lobby of the TREC beginning at 12:00 noon on Friday, May 10 and continuing through Saturday afternoon. People who have registered early can sign in and get their welcome bag and those who want to register can do so then, if there is still room. A program with detailed information will be provided to each birder in the welcome bag so plans can be made for each day.

Prior and early registration is recommended until April 10 since the limit is 150 people. If you register after April 10 the rates increase. A new event added this year is Kayak Birding for which you must register early since participation is limited. Registration forms and fees can be found at our website: presqueisleaudubon.org. You will also find tentative information about the field trips and workshops there. If you have questions or want to talk with someone you can call 814-860-4091.
