THE PRESIDENT'S PERCH

In the meantime, I'll mark time watching my feeders as I tend to my indoor chores. When those are done I guess there is always the Olympics, but I have yet to find a sport that can hold my interest. In my quest for entertainment during this long and frigid winter's day (after my 5 turns at Candy Crush were all used up) I found myself wondering what Olympic Bird Watching might look like and how it might be scored. ADVOCATE'S ALLEY HB1576 Update

It now appears that House Bill 1576 will come up for a final vote in the state House on March 11, 2014. That means that this is our last opportunity to kill this harmful piece of legislation. According to Scott Weidensaul, the only reason that this bill was not rammed through and voted into a law has been the incredible outpouring of opposition from the PABIRDS and Audubon Action communities. While we are up against some powerful forces with deep pockets, we've made our own voices heard and have stopped the bill from becoming a law, so far.

According to Scott and his contacts, the gas industry is pulling out all the stops to push their agenda through the passage of this bill including withholding funding to representatives that won't agree to vote for the bill. This bill is said to be perhaps their biggest priority and they will make those who oppose it pay a price.

At the time of this writing, we are 10-15 votes away from stopping the passage of this bill and

even representatives who said they were against it may be reconsidering in the face of threats from the industry. We cannot let this happen for the sake of Pennsylvania's wildlife and natural ecosystems!

If you do not want to see this bill passed please contact your legislators!! If you've done so already, do it again by email or phone just to let them know you're touching base and keeping track. My own representative is actually a co-sponsor of the bill, but I have written him again letting him know in no uncertain terms my opposition of the bill and that I will not only speak through my letter but also through my vote.

PIAS HOSTS CITIZEN SCIENCE EVENTS
Christmas Bird Count
Great Backyard Bird Count

"Citizen Science" seems to be the new buzz phrase in bird conservation circles these days and there are a few great reasons why. Now more than ever everyday people are networking with each other and scientists to gather information at a level that would be far too expensive and time consuming to be accomplished by scientific bodies alone. In our case, the information and data being collected relates to birds. How apropos since it has been posited by some that the term "citizen science" was coined by Rick Bonney of Cornell's Lab of Ornithology in the late 1970s.

Two prominent Citizen Science projects that PIAS has been participating in for years are the Christmas Bird Count and the Great Backyard Bird Count. The Christmas Bird Count began as a kinder, gentler alternative to the Side Hunt and was the brainchild of Frank Chapman in 1900! That's right, this year marked the 114th Christmas Bird Count (CBC).

CBC

The Presque Isle Audubon Society has been a participating "circle" in the CBC since the mid-1960s. This year the PIAS held our CBC on December 14, 2013. Despite the not very cooperative weather, including occasional dense snow and frigid temps, I think it's safe to say that a fun time was had by all, probably even Ruth Swaney whose car ended up off the road. Although we had hoped for a species count in the 80s we ended up with a total of 74 species with an additional six count week birds (These are birds that are seen 3 days on either side of the circle's official count date. They are noted as being seen but their numbers do not count in the official total.) We set a couple of records in 2013 which is always nice. We recorded record high counts for 4 bird species including Northern Pintail (19), Long-tailed duck (31), Bald Eagle (4) and...drum roll please....Snowy Owl (2)!! We had a total count of 18471 birds, not too shabby for a blustery day of birding. For a complete report of the event including the final tally refer to the PIAS website. Results for the 1758 bird counts that took place

across the world will be posted on the National Audubon website after they are reviewed.

GBBC

The PIAS welcomed the opportunity to collaborate with DCNR this year for the Great Backyard Bird Count which was held at Presque Isle Shelter 2 on February 15, 2014. Another frigid day of bird counting was made a little nicer by the warmth of the fireplace and fine friends.



Because the focus of this count is "backyard" birds, we remained in the shelter and counted birds in the area including at feeders that had been placed outside the shelter. PIAS members provided education about bird identification and explained to participants how they could conduct a count from their own backyard. Our total species count for the GBBC was only 11 with the highlight being a bald eagle that flew over early in the morning. Because the lake has been frozen over we did not get some of the gulls that usually fly over and add to the count. The information gathered from this event has been uploaded to Birdsource.org for placement into their GBBC database.

Thanks to all the PIAS and DCNR volunteers that helped out with these events this year! If you've not participated in one of these events, please consider doing so. It really is a great time as well as a wonderful opportunity to be a Citizen Scientist and make a difference for the birds and other wildlife!

Join PIAS as we welcome Skye's Spirit Wildlife Rehabilitation Center from Harrisville, PA. Robert and Maryjane Angelo will introduce us to their residents such as a red tail hawk, barred owl, American kestrel, skunk and opossum.

Skye's Spirit Wildlife is a non-profit wildlife rehabilitation center in its fifteenth year, dedicated to the care, rehabilitation and release of injured, orphaned and displaced Pennsylvania wildlife. They take all animals with the exception of raccoons, skunks, coyote, fox and groundhog and care for an average of 1,000 animals yearly with a release rate of 73%. Maryjane and Robert Angelo are helping the center to grow yearly by adding new exhibit enclosures for educational wildlife and also adding new rehabilitation enclosures to house the ever growing number of animals needing care yearly. They are working to make it a place where scouts, school children and the public can visit indigenous wildlife and learn how to help it and the environment in their daily lives.
