THE PRESIDENT'S PERCH

Finally, the dawn chorus; I've been enjoying waking to it for a few weeks now. Each day it seems to get a little longer, a little more emphatic and with a crescendo that's a little louder. So far, **and by far, the most boisterous birds have been the robins with their driving but sweet and mellifluous song.** The robins, however, are usually not the first to start. My chorus is started by the cardinals and their ringing "sweet, sweet, bir-dy, bir-dy, bir-dy". Nearly drowned out by the din of the robins and cardinals, the Louisiana Waterthrush can sometimes be heard when he chooses to sing high in a tree. He usually does this for a week or two, I think advertising for a lady love. Once in a while the rhythm of the chorus is broken up by the raspy interjections of the "jay, jay, jay, jays". While blue jays possess a hearty repertoire of vocalizations (I especially like their flute-like whistles) these mornings all I've been treated to is "jay" and a few mimics of a red-shouldered hawk. We do have a good number of song sparrows in the area though I seldom hear them at the peak of the chorus. I read somewhere that the chorus is often sung by different birds at different times depending upon where they perch to sing. Higher perchers sing the earliest so perhaps the song sparrows are waiting their turn in the dawn chorus round. Just today the song sparrow was joined by the silvery slurs of "Oh, Sam Peabody, Peabody, Peabody" as sung by, yes, the white-throated sparrow.

BIRDING TIPS AND REMINDERS FOR MAY

Prepare for spring warbler migration: Listen to audio recordings of the birds to brush up on their calls. Review a field guide to remember what to look for and when.

Fill your hummingbird feeders. The jewels will soon arrive. Dissolve one part sugar into four parts boiling water. Cool the mixture before setting it out for the birds.

Install a water drip or fountain mist to attract birds to your birdbath.

Come and join us for one of the most exciting birding weekends of the year at Presque Isle! We open the weekend on Friday evening by hosting a fun festival reception with good food and friends and music by Frank Singer.

We have excellent leaders doing field trips each day, knowledgeable speakers presenting relevant workshops on Saturday afternoon, and a dynamic keynote speaker on Saturday evening following a delicious dinner.

Some special offerings include visits to the bird banding station, a herpetology field trip, special birds of the night field trip on Friday, and lagoon birding from a pontoon boat.

A continental breakfast will be offered on Saturday and Sunday and a casual pizza party lunch and final bird tally on Sunday.

At our last festival in 2012, birders sighted 146 species with 25 species of warblers! Some of the new species we added that year were osprey, golden eagle, sora, spotted sandpiper, both species of cuckoo, pileated woodpecker, Northern mockingbird, Tennessee warbler, blackpoll warbler, mourning warbler, Canada warbler, and clay-colored sparrow. Perhaps the most exciting bird that we had was a beautiful summer tanager which showed up overhead by the Fry's Landing banding station.

One last reason to attend our festival is to hear our keynote speaker, Sharon Stiteler, also known as "birdchick". She will talk about adventures from her "office", which might be in the middle of a cornfield watching eagles or flying 100 feet above the Mississippi River counting ducks.

THE RAPTOR EXPERIENCE

Many thanks to Martha, Bob and all the Tamarack Wildlife Rehab and Education volunteers who helped out at the 2014 Raptor Experience, co-sponsored by PIAS and the DCNR. With the help of Tamarack's volunteers and education birds we were able to allow families to get up close and personal with the education raptors including Lady Hawk (red-tailed hawk), Pierre (peregrine falcon),



Willow (gray-phase eastern screech owl),

Jasper (red-phase eastern screech owl), and Sophia (barred owl). Affording children and adults this proximity to the birds helps provide an intimacy not capable in the wild and gives people a different sense of how special these majestic birds are. By providing this education and experience Tamarack, PIAS and DCNR hope to engage people, opening them up to the importance of bird and environmental conservation and respect for birds of prey and all wildlife.

This year we had approximately 450 people visit the education birds of prey and ask many great questions including how the birds behave in the wild, how they were injured and how they were rehabbed by the great team at Tamarack. As always, Bob, Martha and crew did a great job as always answering questions and providing information about raptors. (Cont. on page 7)

THE RAPTOR EXPERIENCE (Cont.)

As an added bonus this year, we had the special honor of showing Pennsylvania Bald Eagles: Celebrating 30 Years of Restoration, a film produced by the PA Game Commission (with cinematography editing by our own Tracy Graziano) on the Big Green Screen at TREC. The film is a great documentary that includes information about the reintroduction of the bald eagle into PA in the 1970s when only about 3 nests were known to exist and the success that the eagle has had in PA since then.

The film also features wildlife rehabbers from Tamarack and Skye's Spirit discussing their experiences over the years rehabbing and releasing injured or sickened eagles. On hand to explain a little about the movie and to field questions after the screening was Tim Hoppe of the PA Game Commission who did a great job answering some pretty thoughtful and intriguing questions.

WEED WARRIOR UPDATE

The weed warriors under the direction of Matthew Pluta opened the 2014 work season with an orientation meeting for new volunteers on Thursday, April 24 at the TREC. A visual recap of what was accomplished last year along with plans for this year were presented.

In 2013, 516 volunteers spent a total of 798 hours treating 108 acres at Presque Isle State Park. Most of the effort was focused on Oriental Bittersweet, but significant time was spent getting rid of garlic mustard and purple loosestrife as well.

This year will see volunteers again spending most of the time cutting Oriental Bittersweet vines. This effort will last all through the summer months. There is a small window of time when garlic mustard and purple loosestrife can be "harvested" so effort to eradicate those invasives will occur during those "windows".

Presque Isle Audubon has a special volunteer force working as Weed Warriors and that group is scheduled for work sessions three times a month, twice on Wednesdays and once on a Saturday. Our first work session occurred on Saturday, April 26 at Fry's Landing.

Bob Gallivan, Pat Howell, Ron Intrieri, Janet Price (Lead Steward), Barb Shannon, and Dolores and Joao Tavares worked 1 ½ hours cleaning out garlic mustard plants and clearing paths of fallen branches. A big thanks to them for time well spent.
