Fall Birding

Every season brings with it a unique experience for bird watchers. While there are checklists, historical reports, maps, and forecasts, the predictability does not diminish the joy of each sighting. Warblers, returning from their breeding grounds, pass through Erie at the same time that the Winter Finch report helps us to look forward to what is to come. Those that are subscribed to the PABIRDS listserv recognize Fall as the beginning of Jerry's waterbird counts. How we enjoy the experience of the season is different, but the importance is that we take the time to savor it.

I was looking for and watching a few warblers in my backyard a week ago. As I looked up into a tree, craning my neck to identify this non-descript drab bird, a few thoughts flew by in rapid succession: This feels like Spring birding... I just want to figure out what this bird is... GISS... That is an interesting looking leaf... No, or very faint wingbars, lots of faded brown/yellow/green coloration... Fall birding stinks... This is a nice challenge... Enjoy the moment... Drew Lanham was such a great speaker...

Reflecting on that presentation by Drew Lanham brought me back around to something that is horribly difficult for me to stay latched onto: enjoy every bird for every moment. Staying in the moment is a struggle for me. It is easy for me to get caught up in the work of the day, the schedule of the week, the

meeting coming up, or the task that needs attending. I enjoy being busy. I forget that peace, stillness, and observation can be productive, too. I forget the need to seek those quiet moments, observing the bird without expectation or anticipation. And thankfully, there are those moments when the pressing need for stillness comes flying back.

AN IRRUPTION IS PREDICTED!

What is an irruption? Irregular seasonal movements of birds. This year it is suggested that we watch for these species to come to our area: red-breasted nuthatches, Pine siskins, evening grosbeaks, common redpolls, Bohemian waxwings and purple finches. Sunflower seeds are a popular food for many of these birds along with thistle seed. Watch your birch trees and and fruiting plants as well especially for the Bohemian waxwings.

FUTURE FIELD TRIPS

On October 13th we will meet at the parking area on Ashton Road at 8:00 AM and hit the trails at Eaton Reservoir/Bull Dam.

Directions: From I-90 turn SE on Rt. 430. Go about 15 miles to Ashton Road. Turn left on Ashton and travel a few miles to the parking area.

On October 27th we'll be back at Presque Isle, meeting at the Stull Center at 8:00 AM and heading to the Thompson Bay Area to survey for waterfowl, waders and whatever else enters our sites. Remember, as with most PIAS events, the field trips are free and open to the public and welcome all levels of experience! FIELD TRIP REPORTS By Michele Rundquist Franz

On September 15th a nice mix of experienced and novice birders hit the trails at McClelland Park for one of PIAS bi-weekly Saturday morning field trips. From the moment we parked, we knew we'd be seeing some birds today. Janet Price, who's been to McClelland Park a few times, most recently representing PIA at the trail opening ceremony, told us that she initially did not have high hopes of seeing many birds at all based on her past experiences there. She and the rest of the crew were happily surprised to see a nice little group of red-bellied woodpeckers and northern flickers in the trees in the distance. Karen Larson, new to birding, got to test drive some birding binoculars courtesy of PIA to get an idea of what she might like to purchase should she catch the birding bug. She also had the benefit of the experienced birders around her describe how to "get on" the bird by guiding her eyes up into the trees. "See that tree to the left of the tallest tree...follow the trunk up to the right where it splits and follow the limb up to just beyond where the leaves turn brown." "Oh, yes!" Success!! We saw several local species as we ventured into the wooded parts of the trail and as we were about to leave the woods we heard what could only have been a warbler. I was surprised to hear a warbler singing so heartily this time of year but glad because it allowed us to search him out. We followed our ears and finally were able to pick out a Magnolia warbler who showed himself a few times through the dense leaves. The "birdiest" part of the park was at the edge of a stand of trees surrounded by medium height bushes as we exited the wooded part of the trail. Several flycatchers were spotted including a yellowbellied flycatcher. We also had a couple of redstarts and a yellow warbler. All in all on this trip we tallied 22 species.

<u>September 29th</u> was another awesome Autumn day for a field trip and today we birded Pine Tree Trail on Presque Isle State Park on the lookout for Fall warblers. While we only saw one species of warbler, numerous yellow-rumped warblers, we had some nice surprises. In all we tallied 29 species including a handsome male purple finch and a diminutive brown creeper.

Another highlight was a young red-shouldered hawk that hung out for most of the morning in the swampy area across from Pine Tree Trail and Thompson Circle. At one point, he gave a spectacular show chasing smaller birds. Although we were fairly certain of our identification, it was cemented later by the unmistakable call of the beautiful buteo. We made a quick stop at the banding station where Sarah Sargent, Master Bander and cofounder of the Erie Bird Observatory, generously explained a few details to the banding process to the group. As an added bonus, we had an impromptu post-birding coffee klatch at Brew HaHa!

A CELEBRATION IN McCLELLAND PARK

A few years ago this 56-acre park on Erie's east side was virtually undeveloped. City workers, in collaboration with Sierra Club volunteers, have added a 1.3 mile trails network that empowers all people to access the scenic areas and experience the ecosystem of an urban park.

This project was made possible by a \$10,000 grant the Lake Erie Group of the PA Sierra Club Chapter received from the Sierra Club Foundation. Additional funding was provided by **Presque Isle Audubon Society** and others. In-kind contributions (time, talent and energy) from local Sierra Club members and many other volunteers provided needed help.

TIPS AND REMINDERS TO HELP BIRDS AND TO HAVE A HEALTHY YARD

Sign up for Project Feeder Watch and become a citizen scientist by counting the birds that come to your feeders from November to April. Sign up at: https://feederwatch.org

Stock up on bird seed and suet for the winter months.

Keep your hummingbird feeders full until two weeks after the last migrant has left.

Rake fallen leaves under shrubs and into garden beds as a protective mulch layer and as foraging areas for birds.

Set up roosting boxes to provide shelter for birds during the winter.
