The Audubon Community Nature Center (ACNC), located in Jamestown, NY is a 570-acre wetland preserve that includes over five miles of trails, a native tree arboretum, picnic areas, a natural play space, and educational gardens for you to explore daily from dawn until dusk. The Nature Center itself is home to the Blue Heron Gift Shop and three floors of interactive exhibits, including live animals, which inform and engage visitors of all ages.

Explore and learn about the nature of this rock city with Tim Baird.

The Little Rock City in the Township of Little Valley, New York north of the City of Salamanca is a 'rock city' of Salamanca Conglomerate rock exposed at an elevation of approximately 2200 feet. At this location, large blocks of the conglomerate rock are separating from their parent layer and gravity is moving them downhill. In addition to being of local geological interest, the location lies within the Rock City State Forest. The surrounding forest is a habitat of mature trees and hosts many interesting plants and animals, including several species of birds. The visit will last from two to three hours in exploration of this interesting natural area. Little Rock City can be accessed by turning off Route 219 north of Salamanca on to Hungry Hollow Road then turning left on to the Little Rock City road at the top of the hill and continuing to the end. Alternatively, one can use Whig Street, turning off from Route 353 north of Elkdale. Hungry Hollow Road can be then accessed turning right from Whig Street and continuing to the top of the hill then right on to the Little Rock City road. Tim Baird, a Salamanca resident and nature enthusiast, will lead the walk. Tim is a retired teacher and has lead walks for many years at the Allegheny Nature Pilgrimage. He has spent much time studying local natural history and enjoys nature photography.

The Allegany Wildlands is located within a portion of the Allegheny Plateau that was never covered by the glaciers in the last ice age, making it an extremely rare landscape in New York State. The forest's rich soils weren't scoured by glaciers, and they support a diverse plant community that includes rare orchids, a threatened fern, and several surviving American Chestnut trees that provide hope for the future of this threatened species.

This remarkable landscape — a 200-acre privately-owned forest near Allegany State Park — is threatened, and the Land Conservancy is working with the community to raise \$879,000 by the end of this year to protect it and open it to the public. Part of a large tract of forest, it forms a perfect corridor of connectivity with Pennsylvania's vast forests to the south. Some of our region's most iconic mammals, such as black bears, bobcats, porcupines, and fishers all likely roam here.

It is also part of a globally significant Important Bird Area — a designation it shares with the Everglades, the Galapagos, and our own Niagara River — because of its abundant nesting warblers and other songbirds.

Join the Land Conservancy's Deputy Executive Director, Jajeon Rose-Burney, for a virtual tour of this magnificent forest. If the Land Conservancy can reach their fundraising goal by the end of this year and protect the Allegany Wildlands, it will become part of the Western

New York Wildway, a proposed system of protected wildlife habitat connecting Pennsylvania's forests to the Great Lakes, the Finger Lakes, and beyond.

Jajeon Rose-Burney was born and raised in Western New York. He has a bachelor's degree in environmental design and a master's degree in urban planning, both from the University at Buffalo (UB). After graduating in 2007, he worked at the Urban Design Project, a research center at UB, on several local planning efforts, environmental coalition building, and non-profit development. As a graduate student, Jajeon studied in the Sustainable Futures program in Costa Rica, and taught in the same program while working for the Urban Design Project. From 2010 to 2012 he served as a Peace Corps Volunteer stationed with Mexico's federal environmental agency in Puebla, a large city in southern Mexico, along with his wife Ana. There, he helped protect a large wetland from rapid and unplanned urban development, a project that led to an international Ramsar Site designation for the wetland and a new state park. This project won the 2013 International Planning Award from the American Planning Association (APA). Jajeon has written numerous articles and books on environmental topics, leads bird and nature tours, and has worked with several environmental organizations.



Buffalo Audubon serves the metropolitan area of Buffalo. It has several preserves and manages the Beaver Meadow Nature Center. Buffalo Audubon Society offers events throughout the year. BAS has several leaders that participate in the Pilgrimage each year.

Allenberg Bog is accessible only through our guided tours, as it is home to several rare plant species, and can be difficult to traverse in some areas. A regionally unique example of a high elevation floating Bog and kettle pond wetland complex formed on a glacially derived lake in Western New York. The site also contains an alkaline meadow and several acres of Rhododendron, many of which exceed 20ft. Join Audubon Naturalist Tom Kerr at Buffalo Audubon's best kept secret. We'll hike through the different habitats leading into the bog looking for nesting Canada Warblers and other birds that rely on this unique and special habitat.

Forest Bathing is a translation of Shinrin-Yoku, a Japanese therapeutic practice of nature immersion. Science confirms that “taking in the forest atmosphere” on a regular basis is beneficial in numerous ways to human physiological health and psychological well-being. In turn, indigenous wisdom teaches that cultivating relationships with “all our kin” in the natural world supports their health and can relieve stresses they are experiencing currently. During this walk, your guide will offer invitations to slow our pace, set aside our “devices” and rest the “thinking” mind as we introduce ourselves to a small area of Beaver Meadow near Kettle Pond and its more-than-human inhabitants. We’ll exercise our senses (there are more than five!) and engage with the “wood-wide-web,” stopping along the way to share with each other what we’re noticing.

Beaver Meadow is Buffalo Audubon’s 324-acre nature preserve in North Java, NY. The preserve features its namesake beaver meadow with its associated ponds, glacial kettle ponds, wetlands with a boardwalk trail, wooded uplands, meadows, a hawk watch, an arboretum, and eight miles of well-marked trails.



Travel the outer trails of Beaver Meadow with ANP guide, Brian Deck. The talks will focus on the flora, fauna, history and environment around us. Anything interesting and appropriate is fair game to talk about. Hikes may be on uneven or slippery ground. Please dress for the weather, wear appropriate footwear and bring a snack and drink to eat on the trail if you'd like.
