THE PRESIDENT'S PERCH

This spring, do you really want to make your yard more friendly to birds while using native plants? Then definitely visit the Ornithology Center for some eye-opening advice. Here's a teaser from that website: "Most bird-friendly yard websites only urge homeowners to add native plants to increase songbird survival. Of course, we do also. But the other sites do not show homeowners how to make their yard safe for birds. This website does. Bird window strikes at residences kill hundreds of millions of birds every year. On average, there are two to ten deaths per year at every home. Once you introduce native plants into your vard and start attracting more birds, you also need to put up window strike protection. If you do not, birds will die hitting your windows and undercut the very purpose of your native plantings." When you visit the Ornithology Center, you'll see links; for native plant plans, for protecting birds from deadly bird collisions, and for other helpful information.

Are you having trouble figuring out if you're due to renew your membership in National Audubon or our local Chapter, Presque Isle Audubon? A DEFENSE OF THE UNHOLY TRIO

Pigeons, starlings, and house sparrows are the most abundant and easily observed birds in urban settings. They can be entertaining to watch and to listen to. Give them a chance, and you might even appreciate their beauty. Nature writer Billy Brown discusses their history, their place in the urban food web, and why he recommends that beginning birders start with the most disrespected birds in the urban landscape.

After teaching German for 30 years and working as a teacher naturalist for Peace Valley Nature Center for over 10 years, Heidi Shiver has focused more than ever on advocating for the environment and is especially passionate about native plants and habitat restoration for our birds and wildlife and the overall ecosystem. As a member of Bucks County Audubon's Board and also Board President, she helped recreate their Advocacy reinvigorate the board and committee. establish renewable energy as a focus. She has remained active with Audubon by serving at the committee level as well as continuing to lead their book club. She also serves on Doylestown Township's EAC and coordinates their Bird Town Program, is a Bucks County Penn State Master Gardener and serves as the Secretary of the Pennsylvania Audubon Council. For the past 2 years, she's been working intensely to reinvigorate. to strengthen and to grow the state-wide Bird Town Program and to ensure that it's sustainable for years to come.

FIELD TRIPS

Hello Spring!! How many of you are keeping your windows open, even just a little bit, to listen to the dawn chorus!? I delight in the song of the Robins, song sparrows and cardinals who are in full voice when I wake up for work; the chickadees and tufted titmice join in a bit later. I anticipate that the Eastern phoebe will arrive any day now and add his two cents. With the arrival of Spring and the increase in bird activity, we are excited to start our Saturday morning birding field trips again at Presque Isle. BINOCULARS AT THE LIBRARY? By Ken Andersen

Would you like to go birding but lack binoculars and an identification guide? Well, now Presque Isle Audubon (PIA) and the Erie County library system can provide you with everything you need to have a day of fun in nature by yourself, with a friend, or a child.

Presently, you can go to Blasco library or a branch and check out a backpack containing two binoculars, illustrated field guides to birds, and detailed instructions on how to use the binoculars properly. These aids were purchased by (PIA) and donated to the library.

Six of the backpacks are available now but we expect to add several more yet this spring. One binocular (Vortex) in each backpack is better used by an adult while the other (Kiowa) being lighter in weight is appropriate for either an adult or child. Take the borrowed binos to a nearby park with trees or choose your own backyard to begin enjoying the birds that are living near you. Maybe this will enhance your interest in birds to the point you wish to learn more. If so, there are many sources on the internet where information can be found: two great local sources are the web sites for Presque Isle Audubon Society (www.presqueisleaudubon.org) and Erie Bird Observatory (www.eriebirdobservatory.org).

ERIE COUNTY RAPTOR SURVEY SUMMARY 2023

Pennsylvania Winter Raptor Survey routes have been run since 2001, however, through most of that time Erie County has had little coverage, usually just one route being monitored. Beginning in 2019, two new routes were added to the earlier route, and those three routes have been run each year since, allowing comparisons. (Cont. on Page 6)

ERIE COUNTY RAPTOR SURVEY SUMMARY (Cont.)

The Erie City and NE County Shoreline is covered by Mary Birdsong and Mike Plyler. Scott Stoleson and Don Watts monitored SE Erie County and Janet Price and Pat Howell reported on SW Erie County.

Below are the summed counts from all three routes for eight species usually seen each year on the Erie routes, with the 2023 total and average since 2019.

<u>SPECIES</u>	2023	<u>Average</u>
Red Tails	19	26
Rough Legs	1	1.8
Kestrels	1	1.6
Coopers Hawk	1	1.6
Bald Eagle	1	6.8
Red Shoulders	2	3.2
Merlin	1	1
Peregrine	0	0.8

All eight species were a bit below average in Erie in 2023. Statewide, Red-tails and Kestrels were above average, probably because of the mostly mild weather. Northwestern counties, including Erie, have relatively few wintering Kestrels (most are the Susquehanna valley farmlands) – most years the Erie weather and snow cover are not favorable for the little falcons.

Also likely due to the mild weather, not many Rough-legged Hawks came south to PA. Erie had one of only 25 for the entire state (fewest since 2002, when coverage statewide was still low), most of which were in the northwestern counties.

The biggest deviation from average was Bald Eagle. Only one was recorded compared to the 5-year average of nearly 7. Previous years have had 7-10. One year's numbers, low or high, don't mean much – numbers on these types of surveys can go up and down quite a bit from one year to the next; it's the long term trend that matters. #
