THE PRESIDENT'S PERCH

Spring is technically here, but in northwest PA it may be a while until it actually feels so. But let's still plan on warmer weather and getting outdoors.

Join us for a nature walk on May 1st, Sunday, 1PM at the Erie National Wildlife Refuge in Crawford County at Guy's Mills. We'll not only look at birds, but check out other critters and plants. We can choose one (or both!) of two easy hiking trails there. Tsuga Trail is 1.5 miles long; Deer Run Trail is 3.3 miles. Both are mostly flat and suitable for youngsters, with a variety of habitats to explore. We'll meet at the Refuge Headquarters parking lot.

Asbury Woods is hosting the City Nature Challenge 2022 for Greater Erie, April 29 – May 2. From their website: "This international community science event challenges us to explore the biodiversity around us. Everyone is welcome, all you need to do is download the free iNaturalist app from either the App or Play store on your phone or tablet, create an account, go outside and start exploring!" the Challenge, we'll be exploring Shade's Beach Park in Harborcreek for a few hours on Friday, April 29. We'll meet at the parking lot there at 10AM. Picnic time is approaching also, yeah! We're having our annual membership meeting in conjunction with a picnic and potluck dinner at the Rotary Pavilion on Friday, June 3rd. We'll supply the subs, wraps and beverages (and door prizes) and you bring a dish to share and a place setting for yourself. Dinner will be at 6PM, but the Pavilion will be opened at 4PM, as we're having outdoor games like cornhole and badminton, plus there's that great playground for kids adjacent to the Pavilion. This get-together is open to all PIA members and their guests, so bring a friend.

Look for email and Facebook reminders a week before all of these events.

We've just about wrapped up a cool project with the Erie County library system, by supplying them with 6 "birding backpacks"; one for the main library, one for the Bookmobile, and 4 for library branches. Each backpack will contain two sets of binoculars, one for adults and a smaller pair for children. Also included in each backpack will be two books; both are Peterson Field Guides (Birds of Eastern & Central North America, and Young Naturalists, Backyard Birds). Kowa Optics was so generous, they donated 6 pairs of binoculars! Vortex Optics joined in by offering a 50% discount. The backpacks should be available for borrowing by library patrons in mid-May, hopefully in time for spring migration. We're hoping these backpacks entice kids and adults to become interested in bird-watching, and by extension the environment.

She also coordinates the Victoria Christmas Bird Count and hosts Birders' Night for the Victoria Natural History Society. Build it and They Will Come: A Habitat Restoration for Beach Nesting Birds in Barnegat Light, New Jersey

Todd Pover, Senior Wildlife Biologist for the Conserve Wildlife Foundation of New Jersey will describe the work done in a major coastal habitat restoration project in New Jersey that

targeted piping plovers and other beach nesting birds. Learn what they did, the successes and challenges, as well as lessons learned that may apply to other potential plover restorations. Not just a story of bulldozers and sand, you'll be entertained by the stories of individual birds that populated the site since its completion several years ago.

PRESQUE ISLE AUDUBON FIELD TRIPS WILL RESUME IN APRIL 2022

Yes! It's been a long time coming, but our bi-weekly birding field trips will resume in late April 2022. As always, Presque Isle Audubon hosted field trips are open to the public for people of all ages and skill levels and are free of charge. Unless otherwise specified, any field trips on Presque Isle will meet at the Stull Center parking lot at 7:45AM where we will then carpool to our designated trail. All trips are subject to change depending on trail conditions. We will bird in almost any weather unless there is a torrential downpour or a forecast for dangerous conditions. Warm and waterproof clothing and shoes are recommended, especially for trips earlier in the schedule. Slip on waterproof boots can come in handy. Bring your binoculars of course, but we will have a few pairs of binoculars available for use if you or someone you bring doesn't have them. If you have a spotting scope, you are welcome to bring it. FIELD TRIP SCHEDULE

Unless otherwise stated trips will be 8AM-11AM but participants are welcome to join or leave at their leisure. These trips are scheduled for Saturday mornings.

April 23rd: Dead Pond Trail, Thompson Circle, Thompson Bay, marshy area across from Thompson Circle for local songbirds, woodpeckers, waterfowl, gulls, terns

May 7th: Fry's Landing and banding station for spring migrants including warblers, flycatchers as well as local breeding birds returning from wintering grounds.

May 28th: Pine Tree Trail for later migrating warblers, other songbirds

EVERYONE LOVES ZINNIAS

On a warm late July afternoon, iced tea in hand, I parked myself on the porch to enjoy a summer afternoon and watch the traffic in the backyard. This summer the garden is a profusion of zinnias in full bloom all standing three to four feet tall. The flowers are all sizes and a riot of color, and they are attracting a wide variety of "zinnia lovers."

The hummingbirds are loving them along with the hummingbird clearwing moth, various butterflies, and a variety of other pollinators.

In competition for the flowers is the local American Goldfinch crew. They seem to love the zinnia seeds. Some of the flowers have been reduced to nubs as a result of the finches methodically picking off the petals one at a time and chowing down the attached seed.



The finches were enjoying an afternoon snack, and I was loving the show. One male goldfinch landed on a particularly slim flower stem. Every time he tried to reach the flower and seeds, the stem would arch down putting the flower out of his reach. Now keep in mind that there are PLENTY of other zinnias to munch, but he seemed intent on this one small flower.

As I watched, he slid sideways on the stem until it started to bend. Then he pinched the thin stem in his beak, not breaking it but crimping it. Next he grabbed the stem just beyond the crimped spot and worked at bending it back and folding it against the

stronger end of the stem. With his little goldfinch "feet" clenched firmly around both stems, he held them together and inched his way back to where the flower was and enjoyed his snack! With both stems together to make a stronger perch, he didn't have any trouble getting the seeds.

I was amazed! This particular goldfinch must be an Einstein among goldfinches! How did he figure the puzzle out? Where did he learn to bend a stem for his benefit? It almost seemed like rudimentary tool usage. Where there's a will there's a way as the saying goes. Will wonders never cease!?

PENNSYLVANIA WINTER RAPTOR SURVEY

The twenty second PAWRS Project is now on the books. Thanks to all who continue to contribute to the project. It really was a WINTER survey this year. More snow cover than in recent years, but raptor numbers were seemingly not negatively affected by "real" winter. Hours spent doing the survey are **908**, topping last year's record of 890.

Harriers - a good year at **131**, up over 65%

Red-tails - **3259**, up from 2994 last year.

Rough-legs - low at **55**, up from 41 last year.

Kestrels - **635** up from 626 last year

Turkey Vultures - **2975** Black Vultures - **972**

Bald Eagle - **704**, record high.

Sharp-shins - **45** - about average

Cooper's Hawks - **144**, record high.

Red-shoulders - **219** record high.
