Put together by Board members Jaimie Miller and Jennifer Ferrick, the exhibit will be up until the end of October, along with the displays of other Presque Isle Partners (DCNR, Purple Martin Association, Friends of TREC, PA Game Commission, Presque Isle Partnership and Sea Grant).



Your Board of Directors recently voted unanimously to fund window treatments at TREC to prevent bird window collisions that stun and kill birds. Per Holly Best, Assistant Park Manager, DCNR conducted a daily, yearlong study of the grounds around TREC to look for dead or injured birds. They found several, which wasn't surprising. Give them a few months then look for CollidEscape dots on the windows around the café patio and theater although they're designed to be area. inconspicuous to people. Thanks to long-time member Ken Andersen for agreeing to serve as Board Trustee, and new member Jaimie Miller for also signing on as Trustee. It helps to have more people on the Board when it comes to making decisions involving money.

Anybody interested in taking over production of this bimonthly newsletter? Janet Price, who has done the job for decades, says each issue takes 4-5 hours to construct. Qualifications include familiarity with Presque Isle Audubon and Microsoft Word. #### FIELD TRIPS FOR AUGUST/SEPTEMBER

Our bi-weekly birding field trips will resume this month. As always, Presque Isle Audubon hosted field trips are open to the public for people of all ages and skill levels and are free of charge. Unless otherwise specified, any field trips on Presque Isle will meet at the Stull Center parking lot at 7:45AM where we will then carpool to our designated trail. All trips are subject to change depending on trail conditions. We will bird in almost any weather unless there is a torrential downpour or a forecast for dangerous conditions. Waterproof clothing and shoes are recommended. Slip on waterproof boots can come in handy. Bring your binoculars of course, but we will have a few pairs of binoculars available for use if you or someone you bring doesn't have them. If you have a spotting scope, you are welcome to bring it.



August 6th: <u>Six Mile Creek Park</u> on Clark Road, Harborcreek Township for local songbirds, woodpeckers, kingfishers. Meet in the parking area at the end of the driveway.

August 20th: <u>Gull Point Trail</u> and observation tower for shorebirds, local songbirds

**September 17th:** <u>Pine Tree</u> Trail for warblers and other migrants returning to their wintering grounds

**October 1st:** <u>Fry's Landing</u> for warblers and other migrants returning to their wintering grounds

She says, "I seem to do best at Valu Home Center. I get almost everything there, it's a fair price, and one stop for everything. The birds like Morning Song products: the Cardinal wild bird seed, and the Trail Mix wild bird food, which is mostly Woodpeckers especially love the peanuts. Morning Song Year-Round suet. I also get a lot of success with the Audubon Park Wild Finch and Small Songbird mix. I have found a similar product called Better Bird Finch food at Buzz-N-B's pet store. Tractor Supply Company's Royal Wing Fruit & Nut mix is good. I don't have much storage space and I wouldn't want the food to go bad or get eaten by mice, so I need to be notified before you bring in any donations."

## BARN SWALLOWS on PRESQUE ISLE, 2022 By Issie Lawrie, PIA Member



This year I had the pleasure of watching Barn Swallows nest and rear their young on Presque Isle State Park. Observing these birds is one of the most unique and exciting ways to see nature up close. I counted 23 nests at various locations on Presque Isle; there could have been more. When I pointed out the nesting activity to family groups at the <u>Rotary Pavilion</u>, or to youngsters at the floating <u>Fishing Pavilion</u> or to beach goers at the <u>Beach 10</u> <u>Bathhouse</u>, they were all as thrilled as I to watch these special birds.

Around 25 years ago, my teacher buddies met weekly at the <u>Cookhouse Pavilion</u> for brunch. The Barn Swallows dove in and out of the pavilion, feeding their young. What a spectacle to watch what David Sibley calls our most graceful swallow. But now that pavilion has the ceiling area enclosed so, sadly, there are no Barn Swallows to see there.

The <u>covered picnic area</u> behind the Rotary Pavilion is another favored, sheltered location for the Barn Swallows to nest. Each spring, at the Festival of the Birds, it is a pleasure and a delight for Festival guests to watch the Barn Swallows build their nests. It is an incredible experience to see these beautiful birds raise their young. Why watch nature shows on TV when you can see the spectacle of life renewing with your own eyes?

Barn Swallows also caught Jamie's Hill's attention in 1982. Jamie titled his masters thesis "Reproductive Success in the Barn Swallows (Hirundo rustica): Effects of Nest Reuse and Age". It is well worth the read. In his research Jamie found that a significant number of Barn Swallows reused the nests that had been made in a previous year. The birds that reused a nest raised more young than those who had to start from scratch and were more likely to raise a second brood. The birds who had to build a new nest made more than a thousand mud-hauling trips, laboring from 8 to 12 days.

It is illegal to destroy or disturb nests with birds or eggs in them. After reading Jamie's research I would go one step further and propose that the Barn Swallows' nests be allowed to stay in position all year. Returning birds would have the advantage of reusing their nest and thus improve their reproductive chances.

With bird populations showing a drastic decline overall, this one simple caring action would go a long way to help our feathered friends.
