Strategically Planning for Our Future

Were you aware that Presque Isle Audubon has a Strategic Plan? Have you read it? If you answered no to either question, you are not alone, yet we do have such a guiding document. Over the next several issues of the *Tern of Events*, I am going to highlight a section of the Strategic Plan so that we, as a community, can continue to do good works based on a shared vision. The PIA Executive Board will be working through this document as well, and I encourage everyone to become active in seeing the vision brought to fruition.

Here then is the first section of the Strategic Plan;

The Purpose:

This strategic plan was developed over the course of 24 months, beginning in July of 2013 and concluding in June of 2015. It represents an evolution of thought and effort, with contributions coming from many members. The intention of this plan is to set a roadmap for continuing Presque Isle Audubon's long history of doing work which benefits birds, the environment, and the people in our community. While the plan is not meant to be exclusive and limiting the group to only what is contained within, it is meant to help steer decisions through a common and shared vision for a period of five years.

**PIA PROGRAM FOR FRIDAY, OCTOBER 20
"BIRD-SAFE WINDOWS"
By Heidi Trudell**



Hundreds of millions of healthy birds are killed per year when they collide with glass at residences and office buildings. This is a serious problem: bird populations are facing steep declines, and aside from habitat loss and cats, glass collisions are the leading cause of death.



In order to save birds, we need to understand how we impact their lives. Trudell will discuss the ethics of attracting birds to our yards, and exploring the risks we pose to them as well as discussing solutions to keep them safe. Additionally, learn about how valuable dead birds are to research and science, and how we can respectfully make sure that every dead bird becomes a learning opportunity.

Heidi Trudell is chair of Great Lakes Safe Passage (a branch of Detroit Audubon) as well as the Regional Coordinator in Ypsilanti, MI for

Washtenaw Safe Passage (WSP), an active research branch of Washtenaw Audubon Society. Safe Passage programs are dedicated to making the world a safer place for birds through education, outreach, and monitoring buildings for window collisions. Part of this includes guiding architects through the process of designing bird safe buildings and helping reduce the impacts of existing buildings. Heidi has conducted bird collision surveys on a dozen low-rise structures as part of WSP since 2015. Her avian mortality work began with window studies in southern Illinois in 2003 on a small college campus and she co-authored a publication, *Bird Density and Mortality at Windows*, in 2008. From 2006-2009 she served as a pre- and post-construction wind farm monitor for birds and bats in central Texas. She was heavily involved with Attwater's Prairie Chickens, leading birding tours, nature blogging, and citizen science in West Texas prior to her move to Michigan in 2014.

The Big Sit! 2017 will occur on the Weekend of October 7-8, 2017!

The Big Sit! is an annual, international, noncompetitive birding event hosted by *Bird Watcher's Digest* and founded by the New Haven (Connecticut) Bird Club. Every team that observes the year's "Golden Bird" has a chance to win \$500. Every year, bird watchers from around the globe unite on this special day by participating in this free event, open to any person and club in any country! The Big Sit! is sponsored by Swarovski Optik.

The Big Sit! is like a Big Day or a bird-a-thon in that the object is to tally as many bird species as can be seen or heard within 24 hours. The difference lies in the area limitation from which you may observe.

Some people have called it a "tailgate party for birders." Find a good spot for bird watching—preferably one with good views of a variety of habitats and lots of birds. Next, create a real or imaginary circle 17 feet in diameter and sit inside the circle for 24 hours, counting all the bird species you see or hear. That's it. Find a spot, sit in it, have fun. Then submit your findings.

Participants are allowed to come and go from the circle—especially for the purpose of bringing food back into the circle—and the circle need not be occupied for the entire 24 hours.

There are Big Sit! circles all over the world, including Guatemala, India, the Netherlands, England, Vietnam, and New Zealand. **Why not plan one for Erie, Pennsylvania!**

JOAN HOWLETT, LONG TIME PRESQUE ISLE AUDUBON MEMBER



Joan S. Howlett, age 78, of Saline, Michigan, died Saturday, September 9, 2017. She was born in Erie, Pennsylvania, the daughter of the late John K. and Luella (Miller) Specht. She resided in Edinboro, Pennsylvania for more than 40 years with her husband, Dorn Howlett, before moving to Michigan.

She was an avid birder and an active member of the Presque Isle Audubon Society, leading field trips, acting as compiler of the Erie Christmas Bird Count, and designing and maintaining their website. She taught a Continuing Education Course on Birding. She participated in the Pennsylvania Breeding Bird Atlas Project, and volunteered at the Erie National Wildlife Refuge, and for the Purple Martin Conservation Association.

Joan also edited the PIA newsletter for a number of years before she left for Michigan and continued her input when requested for years after leaving.

Her dedication to PIA made a difference and is acknowledged and appreciated.
